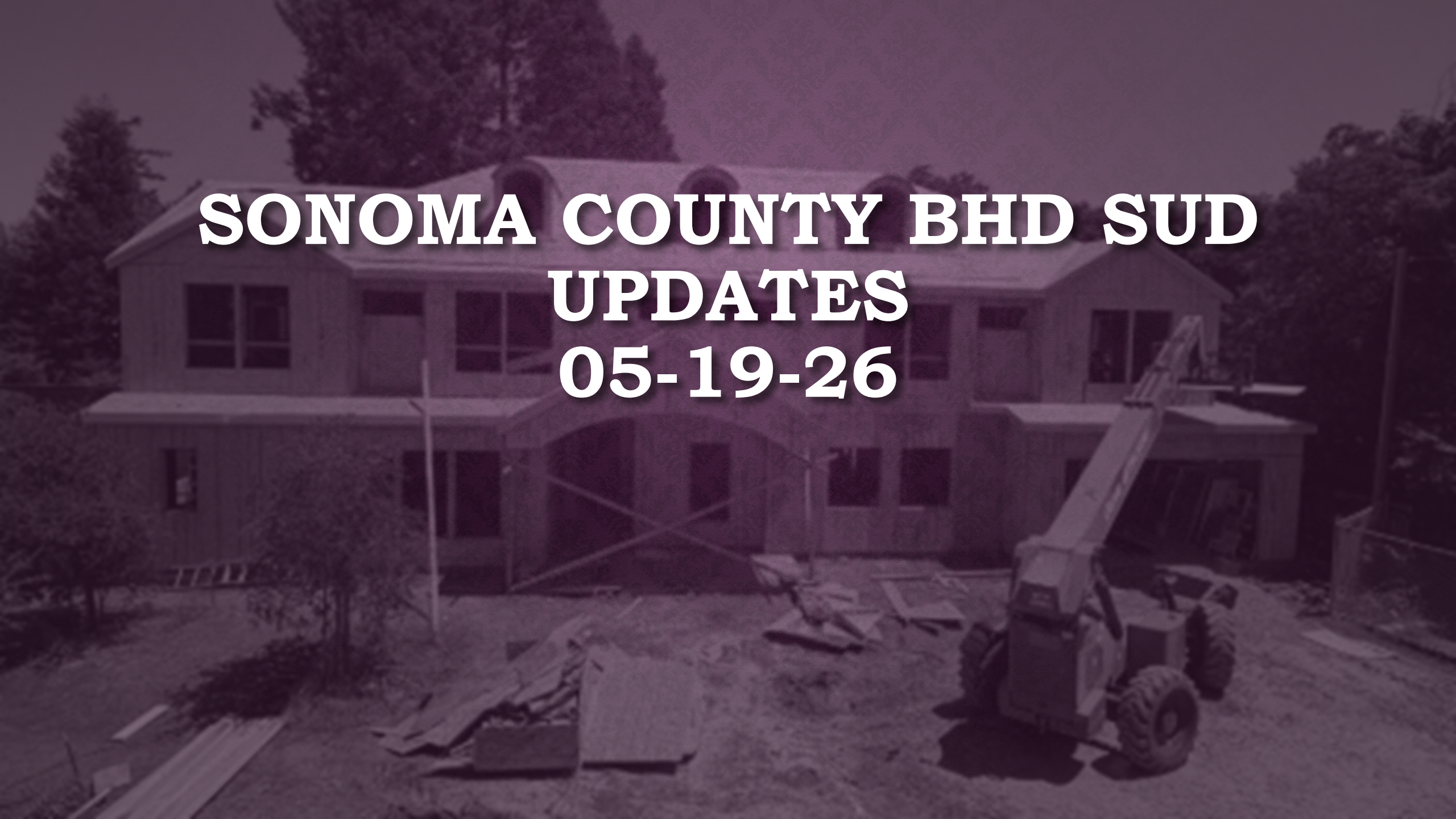




SONOMA COUNTY BHD SUD UPDATES 05-19-26

OPIOID SETTLEMENT FUNDS (OSF)

Buckelew \$3.873M award progress

Recovery residences “Housing for Hope”

- First property Doyle Park 23% done
- Projected completion early August
- Fulton area second site selected
- Prioritize regional and racial equity
- 50+ planned beds, fully funded and self sustaining (community supports benefit)

OPIOID SETTLEMENT FUNDS (OSF)

West County Health Centers \$637,365 award progress

Prevention, Education, Harm Reduction

- Hired 1.0 FTE SUD Family Care Manager
- Hired 0.5 FTE SUD Coordinator
- 16 community outreach events with 1,722 community members engaged (youth)
- 194 Narcan Units & 110 Fentanyl test strips distributed (youth & homeless)
- Digital story telling from Silence Speaks Team

OPIOID SETTLEMENT FUNDS (OSF)

BHCIP Youth Facility (SUD & Crisis MH) for youth 12-17

- Regional Partnerships – 9 other counties interested
- Construction completion 7/1/27, Licensing and Certification by 12/31/28
- Design meetings down to selecting interior design elements (finishes, materials, layout).
- Discussion of locks and door hardware getting more into the day to day
- Discussion of key activity elements: rock climbing wall, music fixtures, gardening

SUD TREATMENT EXPANSION UPDATES (NEW PROVIDERS)

Pura Vida – outpatient and intensive outpatient (ASAM 2.1)

- 9 active enrollments in treatment
- 33 program enrollments since opening in November 2025

Siyan – outpatient (ASAM 1.0 + MAT)

- 15 active enrollments in treatment
- 26 program enrollments since opening in November 2025
- Psychiatric and other supportive medications for recovery

West County Health Center - outpatient (ASAM 1.0 + MAT)

- Piloting assessments and processes not live yet

SUD TREATMENT EXPANSION UPDATES (NEW SERVICES)

Buckelew Orenda Program

- Added men's residential treatment (ASAM 3.1 and 3.5) 10 beds
- Increased withdrawal management (ASAM 3.2) up to 10 beds
- Note: 3.5 = clinically managed high intensity, 3.1 = clinically managed low intensity

Buckelew Athena House

- Added women's residential (ASAM 3.5) to existing facility

Muir Wood

- Contract with 2 dedicated beds for youth (12-17)
- Option to bridge gap until BHCIP facility is build and live

SUD TREATMENT EXPANSION UPDATES (NEW SERVICES)

DAAC Adolescent Treatment Program – back in schools!

- Amarosa Academy – Santa Rosa
- Rancho Cotati High School – Rohnert Park
- El Camino High School (ELCO) – Rohnert Park

DAAC Mobile Narcotic Treatment Vehicle (MNTP)

- Grant funded to start and sustained through Medi-Cal dollars
- Approved and live serving SDTRC (DAAC residential in SR)
- Provides all non-Methadone MAT services
- Planned Expansions

Studio's at Montero (Petaluma)

Eliza's Village (Santa Rosa)

More to be determined rural areas

SUD TREATMENT EXPANSION UPDATES (NEW SERVICES)

Recovery Services - DMC-ODS benefit

- Support recovery, prevent relapse, emphasize self management, internal resources, and community resources
- Can be a standalone service or as part of an existing treatment episode
- Often delivered as “aftercare” post program prevention for support such as long-term maintenance or relapse prevention
- Can be in clinical or non-clinical settings
- Provider assessment or member self-assessment of relapse risk
- Includes counseling, recovery monitoring, substance abuse assistance, education and job skills support, family support, support groups, and ancillary services

SUD TREATMENT EXPANSION UPDATES (INDIAN HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS IHCP)

New Life

- Tribal enterprise wholly owned by Pinoleville Pomo Nation
- New Life Clinic located in Ukiah
- Contracted to provide Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) services to tribal members for Sonoma County Medi-Cal members
- 4 active enrollments in treatment
- 17 enrollments since January 2025 start
- Planning to do Traditional Health Care Practices (THCP) Medi-Cal benefit (TBD)

Sonoma County Indian Health Project (SCIHP)

- **Traditional Health Care Practices (THCP)**
- **MOU with county to be executed 7/7/26 BOS meeting**
- **DHCS administration and oversight**
- **Sonoma is pass through for payment only**
- **SCIHP getting reimbursed for culturally appropriate services**

SUD TESTING TEAM

Switched to Millennium from Redwood Toxicology

- More sensitive drug testing puts less burden on those receiving testing services
- 1058 urinalysis tests as of 05/12/26

- Lakes Outpatient Treatment site vs state averages

Marijuana 2% (lakes) vs 19% state

Methamphetamine 1% (lakes) vs 9% state

Cocaine 1% (lakes) vs 2% state

- County Savings - \$4000-\$6000 per month down to \$0 per month
- Millennium routinely updates and adds new substances to its testing lists

TASC Program Changes – court ordered program

- **OLD Program:** residential treatment then TASC aftercare
- **NEW Program:** ASAM drives medical necessity

Step down to outpatient and intensive outpatient services

TASC case worker role expanding case management

Shift from single episode of treatment to continuum of care

Shift assessment to outpatient treatment provide for transitions, retention, and improving engagement

Changes in court minutes to reflect more robust treatment continuum

SUD DRUG COURT + PROP 36

Drug Court Program

- Prior to Prop 36, 5-10 participants in recent years
- Integrating prop 36 clients now up to 25 active participants

Anticipate growth to 50 in next 2 years

- Prop 36 grant \$469,806 – address gaps

Staff costs (unfunded mandate)

Recovery residences (housing resource)

- Prop 36 clients not on formal probation as a challenge
- Working on contracts with 2-3 recovery residence providers

SUD PREVENTION

New Hope for Youth

- Community based prevention and early intervention for youth
- Mentorship, prevention-focused case management, life skills groups, pro-social activities, and family engagement
- Support for youth experiencing substance use risk, school challenges, family stress, and related needs
- Strengths-based, trauma-informed, culturally responsive, and bilingual service model
- Community and school-based approach designed to reduce barriers and increase access to support
- Focus on strengthening protective factors, increasing connection to positive supports, and promoting healthy decision-making
- Transition of the Youth DUI Program into NHFY services helps provide a more coordinated, youth-centered response for court-involved youth, with opportunities for continued support beyond program requirements

SUD PREVENTION

School based resource navigation and reentry support

- **Support school transitions for youth at Juvenile Hall, Valley of the Moon, and other foster youth**
- **Rapid connections to school-based resource supports for stability and engagement**
- **Resource navigation for best fit based on availability at schools**
- **Closed loop information sharing with schools**
- **Examples: wellness centers, counseling, workshops, skills building, conflict mediation, peer support, substance use support, community-based resources**

SUD PREVENTION

Substance Use Health and Prevention Week: Bringing prevention education and resources directly to students

- Classroom workshops SUD and harm reduction
- Lunch-time student engagement activities
- Connections to adults, school supports, and community resources
- Flexible to adapt to needs and capacity of each school

Benefits: improved decision making, increased protective factors, stigma reduction, and improved prevention collaboration
